Meet Our Speaker - James I. Robertson Jr.

We are once again honored to have our longtime friend and Life Member of our Round Table, James I. 'Bud' Robertson Jr. visit us. He is without question one of the preeminent Civil War scholars and lecturers of our time. So many times in the past he has enlightened our members with informative and entertaining talks. 'Bud' has written and edited over 20 books and countless articles and reviews during his distinguished career. His latest book is

"CIVIL WAR ECHOES—Voices From Virginia 1860 - 1891". His magnificent biography of Stonewall Jackson won eight national awards and served as the basis for the movie 'Gods and Generals'.

James I. Robertson Jr. is a native of Danville, Virginia and a great grandson of a Confederate veteran of the Army of Northern Virginia. He received his B.A. and Litt.D. degrees from Randolph-Macon College and M.A. and PhD degrees from Emory University, where he studied under famous Civil War historian Bell Wiley. He served as Executive Director of the U.S. Civil War Centennial Commission working with Presidents Kennedy and Johnson. He has been honored with several major awards including the 1987 Fletcher Pratt Award, the 1988 Jefferson Davis Medal and the Freeman-Nevins Award. Bud continues to speak at seminars and other venues around the country and has finished 'A Rebel War

Dr. Robertson recently retired from being the Alumni Distinguished Professor in History at Virginia Tech. Since our founding in 1961, Bud Robertson has been a frequent and favorite speaker and we welcome him back once again for what will be a very special evening.



1. In the spring of 1864, Major General William T. Sherman took command of what Western forces/armies?

His 100,000 troops were divided into three forces: Major General George H. Thomas's Army of the Cumberland, Major General James B. McPherson's Army of the Tennessee, and Major General John M. Schofield's Army of the Ohio.

2. When Major General James McPherson was killed in the Atlanta Campaign, who took temporary command of his army and who did Sherman appoint as McPherson's replacement?

During the battle Major General John A. Logan took charge and secured a Union victory. Sherman then named Major General Oliver Otis Howard commander of the Army of the Tennessee.

3. The Confederate Army also experienced changes during the Atlanta Campaign with the death of Lt. General Leonidas Polk and with President Jefferson Davis replacing General Joseph E. Johnston with Lt. General John Bell Hood as commander of the Confederate Army. Who became commanders of Polk's Army of Mississippi and of Hood's Corps?

Major General William W. Loring took over temporarily when Polk was killed. Less than a month later he was replaced by Lt. General Alexander P. Stewart as commander of the Army of Mississippi. Lt. General Stephen D. Lee replaced Hood.

4. How long was the Confederate prison Andersonville in existence?

It was open for 15 months, opening in late February 1864 and closing in early May 1865.

5. What country furnished the most foreign-born Civil War soldiers?

Historians believe that was Germany.

Washington and Lee's Church Gives Them the Boot!

In an astonishing story in which political correctness has reached a new low, Christ Church in Alexandria, Virginia, of which George Washington was one of the founders and Robert E. Lee was a long time member, has officially kicked them out!

George Washington was one of the founding members of Christ Church in Alexandria, buying pew No. 5 when the church first opened in 1773, and attending for more than two decades. Last week the church announced it was pulling down a memorial to its one-time vestryman and the country's first president, saying he and another famous parishioner, Robert E. Lee, have become too controversial and are chasing away would-be parishioners.

While acknowledging "friction" over the decision, the church's leadership said the twin memorials, which are attached to the wall on either side of the altar, are relics of another era and have no business in a church that proclaims its motto as "All are welcome — no exceptions." "The plaques in our sanctuary make some in our presence feel unsafe or unwelcome. According to the church, "Some visitors and guests who worship with us choose not to return because they receive an unintended message from the prominent presence of the plaques," the church leaders said. This is the height of hypocrisy of a church doing this in the name of "all are welcome – no exceptions." Obviously George Washington and Robert E. Lee are not welcome and neither are a host of other people who believe this is an outrage.

As an original benefactor, Washington bought pew No. 5 when the church opened in 1773. He was a vestryman and contributed to the church throughout his life, according to the Washington Papers project. His family considered the church important enough to him that it donated one of his Bibles after his death. Robert E. Lee attended Christ Church beginning at age 3, when he moved from Stratford to Alexandria. The church was so integral to his family that Mary Custis Lee, his daughter, left the church \$10,000 in her will upon her death in 1918. That money was used to begin the church's endowment.

I bring this to your attention because it must be of vital concern to all of us who value our nation's history. Not only are monuments and statues at risk of being removed, but this movement to cleanse our nation's history of all that is controversial has great momentum with cowardly leaders and politicians seeking to take every advantage of it and they will stop at nothing to make themselves look "progressive". We have to ask, where will end or even, does it have an end? What can be done to bring people back to their senses? We have to stay informed. These type of events will become more commonplace as this hysteria sweeps the country. At some point, we will have to take a stand and say enough is enough. That day of reckoning is not too far in the future as this news warns us.
